

Carrara Health Centre grows its services

Carrara Health Centre (CHC) is expanding in more ways than one while continuing to provide even more support for patients through an innovative and supportive care model.

CHC is expanding patient services, increasing parking capacity, and recently celebrated the opening of its sensory gardens.

Nine new beds are also set to open in support of the GEMS and rehabilitation units, while increasing access to outreach services.

Funding has come from the National Health and Hospitals Network National Partnership Agreement on Improving Public Hospital Services and will support a range of clients with cognitive disorders living in the community.

CHC is also set to house two new clinics, cognitive and falls/balance, focusing on diagnosis of illnesses such as dementia and reducing the risk of injuries from falls at home.

The sensory gardens will assist these new programs by allowing patients access to a therapeutic outdoor area (above), playing a vital role in their rehabilitation.

Enthusiastic Carrara staff including nursing and allied health staff were ably supported by Broadbeach Rotarians, to develop and enhance the open area.

Staff undertook fundraising activities, Broadbeach Rotary donated plants and labour while the statewide Dementia Clinical Network (SDCN) within Queensland Health provided funds to complete the gardens.

Work has recently started on construction of an additional 70 carparks next to the CHC to ease the parking pressure in the area and provide better access for staff.

Message from Adrian

The recently released District strategic priorities are a good indication of the challenge and opportunities that lie ahead for the Gold Coast. We have the ongoing responsibility of providing quality public health services while also planning and developing a large complex work program linked to Robina Hospital Expansion, Robina Health Precinct and the Gold Coast University Hospital.

Four priority areas provide a focus for attention and energy and each contains a number of strategies and plans to the end of 2012. The areas are Access to services, Balanced budget, Opening and operating the expanded Robina Hospital and preparing for Gold Coast University Hospital in the online document District Priorities - Definition and strategies. Many of the projects and initiatives highlighted in this newsletter are helping us to achieve these priorities.

The scope and breadth of the topics in the strategic priority document reflect the size of the task ahead. I encourage you to review the priorities and consider which ones you are already supporting, which ones you are passionate about, how you might address the priorities directly or support others to do so.

There are a number of other planning exercises underway to prepare us for the short term (operational plan for next financial year) and the long term (service line planning to 2016) future. Operational plans define the activities and goals of work units in divisions, departments, wards and offices. Each plan contains activities linked to District priorities outlining how and for what reason they will be achieved.

Apart from planning for the future it is important to live in the present. There are some lovely reminders of recent District activities in this edition ranging from Cancer Survivors Day to Team Health at Gold Coast Marathon to the launch of the Sensory Garden at Carrara and the Patient Journey Project barbeques. Positive signs for PJP solutions

The Patient Journey Project (PJP) has moved into an action phase and early indications show signs of improved access to services.

Activities like the PJP Launch BBQs gave project members a chance to get out and hear what staff were thinking and to gain feedback on how the initiative was progressing.

"Our job was to hear what our colleagues and our consumers thought about fixing blockages in our patient flow and now we are working on putting those ideas into action," PJP Project member Dr James Lind said.

"While we are trailing some initiatives and others may be temporary, its about working toward a long term goal of system improvement," he said.

In the early weeks a medical specialist was introduced into the ED, and it appears the number of people waiting more than 8 hours for admission in the ED, was significantly reduced.

Another example has been the introduction of a dedicated MRI slot for emergency neurology inpatients. With the support of both departments, the initiative is another small step in reducing wait times for inpatient services as part of the patient journey.

Better care and less surgery for cancer patients

The Endoscopy team has welcomed the arrival of the new endoscopic and endobronchial ultrasound equipment, allowing a wide range of both diagnostic and therapeutic procedures for the community.

The equipment allows less invasive and more efficient investigation of oesophageal, upper gastrointestinal, pancreatic and lung cancer.

Dr George Ostapowicz said the equipment will increase capacity within the service.

"The equipment is a valuable addition as it enables a more accurate, less invasive and often cheaper way of diagnosing cancers," Dr Ostapowicz said.

"We can undertake more efficient investigations without the need for open surgical procedures for oesophageal, pancreatic and other upper gastrointestinal and bronchogenic (lung) cancers.

"By providing more efficient treatment and reducing their hospital stay, we are able to treat more patients."

The equipment was funded by the Commonwealth Government National Health Reform Agreement - National Partnership Agreement on Improving Public Hospital Services.

The agreement, endorsed by the Council of Australian Governments, aims to invest in emergency department access, elective surgery waiting lists and sub-acute care.



Electronic medical record is almost here

Robina Hospital is buzzing with anticipation as it becomes the first facility in Queensland to implement the Cerner eMR system.

Trials will get underway shortly in the intensive care unit and the palliative care ward as part of the phased implementation approach being taken by the project team.

The eMR project team are on the front foot eagerly procuring computers and scanners in clinical areas in anticipation of the roll out.

Project education sessions have also recently commenced and formal training sessions are also set to start in the near future.

The feedback from these and other events has highlighted how practical and easy the system is to use, confirming the GCHSD is once again at the forefront of modern healthcare.

To ensure patient safety, the Acute Young Adult Unit was closed to allow a 12 month construction program which included building new areas of Building G, and refurbishing the older areas as part of the Robina Hospital Expansion.

Executive Director, Mental Health and ATODS Karlyn Chettleburgh emphasised AYA as a transition service and is pleased that local access to this local service was again available.
